ABOUT CITRINE



Citrine—the transparent, pale yellow to brownish orange variety of quartz—is rare in nature. In the days before modern gemology, its tawny color caused it to be confused with topaz. Citrine's attractive color, plus the durability and affordability it shares with most other quartzes, makes it the top-selling yellow-to-orange gem. It's an attractive alternative not only for topaz, but also for yellow sapphire. The finest citrine color is a saturated yellow to reddish orange free of brownish tints.

Citrine is one of the most popular yellow gems on the market. This designer cut shows off the warm glow of citrine's sunny color. – Lydia Dyer, gem courtesy John Dyer & Co.



Since natural citrine is rare, most of the citrine on the market is the result of heat treatment, which causes some amethyst to change color from undesirable pale violet to an attractive yellow. The amethyst's original hue can determine the richness of the resulting citrine's yellow color.

Low-temperature heat treatment transformed an amethyst into this orangy citrine. A gem carver created the attractive fantasy cut. - GIA & Tino Hammid

Citrine crystals occur in a wide range of sizes, and citrine sizes up to 20 carats are readily available in jewelry. Although citrine is available in standard shapes and sizes, many high-end jewelry designers and gem carvers have fashioned the warm yellow gem into unusual cuts for jewelry and carvings.

Color

Citrine's attractive color, plus the durability and affordability it shares with most other quartzes, makes it the top-selling yellowto-orange gem. A saturated yellow to reddish orange color free of

brownish tints is prized in citrine, although in the contemporary market, citrine's most popular shade is an earthy hue—a deep brownish or reddish orange.

CITRINE'S QUALITY FACTORS

COLOR

Vivid yellows, reddish oranges, and earth tones are popular with consumers.



CLARITY

Microscopic inclusions in citrine are usually not visible without high magnification (as seen in photo at right).


CUT

Citrine might be carved, custom-cut, or calibrated for jewelry use.

CITRINE BIRTHSTONE MEANING & HISTORY

This November birthstone is the transparent yellow to brownish orange variety of quartz, which has been used in jewelry for thousands of years. Citrine has been a popular gemstone since ancient times and has shared a history of mistaken identities with the other November birthstone, topaz. As a result, people thought citrine had the same powers as topaz. They believed the citrine birthstone could soothe tempers and calm the wearer.

The ancient Greeks carved rock crystal ornaments that glistened like permafrost. Roman pontiffs wore rings set with massive purple amethysts, and citrine has been reported in Roman jewelry. It was particularly popular in colorful Scottish jewelry from the Victorian



era. Citrine, believed to derive from the French word for "lemon" (*citron*), is given for the thirteenth wedding anniversary.

Today, most of the citrine in the marketplace results from the heat treatment of amethyst. With its ready availability in a broad range of sizes, citrine birthstone is one of the most affordable and desired yellow gemstones.

IRON
