# Skagit Rock & Club Meeting Notes, April 2024

The meeting was called to order at 10:00 a.m. by Vice President Peggy Peterson. Thirty people were in attendance.

Officers and Board Members present: Peggy Peterson, David Britten, Bruce Hurley, and Charlene Rhodes.

A number of visitors attended the meeting, and Peggy asked them to introduce themselves and describe their interest in rock materials. These visitors included Ben, Jennifer & Emerett Abbott-Scott, Kristy Johnson, Ken & Nancy Henderson, Molly Rooney & Jim Legg, Matt & Kira Offenbreit, Brad Raspet and Jennifer Ross.

Meeting minutes approved as published from March newsletter.

The treasurer's report was read by Dave Britten and approved and seconded as read.

Scholarship Committee: Shelley and Kim met and suggested renaming the scholarship to 'Skagit Rock and Gem Scholarship', questioned if the scholarship could be split, and updating the scholarship applications and website. The Board will meet up to discuss and vote on the changes in the near future.

New Business: Sandy will begin to keep track of maintaining the refreshment bin for future club meetings, beginning in May.

Old Business: A new location for the Skagit club rock shop has been procured just west of Mount Vernon. Moving in will be ongoing, with relocation of the club library being the first priority. Installation of the club lapidary equipment will then be carried out by volunteers over the next few weeks. We also need to work on getting lighting over the work areas and the water system set up.

The nature of future meeting programs was discussed. Increasing the price and quality of minerals for future club events were also mentioned.

Minerals which are yellow in color and interesting specimens found on the local beaches were the program for the April meeting. A number of both kinds of materials were displayed, with a couple of specimens fitting into both categories. Peggy displayed an especially pretty piece of crystallized native sulfur crystals, and several of the beach rocks were interesting head-scratchers.

It was noted that the date of the Everett Rock & Gem Show has been moved up to the first weekend in May this year. The show will on held Saturday, May 4, and Sunday, May 5, at the Evergreen State Fairgrounds just west of Monroe, beginning at 10:00 a.m. each day.

After a short break, the meeting resumed to determine May's Gem of the Month to be agates. Meeting adjourned at 11:50 am.

### **Agates**

<u>Agate</u> is composed primarily of silica (silicon dioxide). Silicon dioxide molecules form a very tight bond with other silicon dioxide molecules. This bond makes agate very hard and durable - around seven (7) on the Mohs scale. Minerals included while the molecules are crystallizing give the agate different colors. Agates are transparent or translucent. Large amounts of mineral inclusion will block light from passing through. The resultant rocks are called <u>jaspers</u>.

The main source of silica is silica rich volcanic material – primarily basalt. Water coming into contact with the hot magmatic materials deep in the earth dissolves the minerals out of the basalt. The silica rich water then cools and deposits crystal in the cracks or voids in the surrounding cooled rock forming the agate.

Masses of cooling and dehydrating silica which form more rapidly are called microcrystalline. Silica, which is formed more slowly, allows the crystalline structures to form into their typical hexagonal faceted aspect.


When large amounts of water are included in the crystalline structure the result is called opal. <u>Opals</u> are not as hard or durable as agates, but the included water can give the resulting rock various forms of iridescence and rainbow flashes.

Agates with distinctive mineral inclusions are given names describing their colors and textures – or they are named after the localities in which they are found. Montana agate is known for its black dendritic inclusions resembling miniature forests of trees. Moss agates are so called because it looks like moss is growing within the agate. Moss agates can be found in many colors. Aventurine agate gets its green color from included microscopic mica. Larger crystals of mica give it sparkly golden flakes.

<u>Chalcedony</u> is another form of silica which includes iron and/or aluminum. It is microcrystalline but has the visual aspect of botryoidal or mammillary. Desert rose agate, chrysocolla (a copper silicate), prehnite, and some carnelians are examples of this type of crystal growth.
